As I write to you today, we are only a few days to the start of Spring, which is when the city will start getting ready for a COVID free Derby. Since infection rates are dropping and more people are vaccinated, the city is planning to bring back our regular events that have been popular in the past but cancelled due to COVID.

City shred day has always been popular in the city, and we have had several calls requesting we do this twice a year, so we have scheduled our first shred day for Saturday May 14th from 9:00 -12:00. The truck will be in Sagamore Park for drop off, so please only bring your personal paper for shredding, NO Cardboard. Our second shred day will be in the fall, but no date has been set yet; look for more information to follow.

Octoberfest is coming back this year to Sagamore Park, so please mark your calendars for Sunday, October 2nd from noon to 3:00. The city will provide food, beverages, and plenty of fun for the kids.

There are a couple safety projects that are scheduled in the city, the first is the re-construction of the bridge on Stonebridge Road. The State of Kentucky has received funding to rebuild the bridge, so it will meet state code for tonnage requirements. This project will take several weeks to complete and caution vehicles will be on Blankenbaker Ln. to help with traffic flow.

The city has approved and contracted a new camera security system to help stop or prevent crime in the city. This system is a network that several other area cities are currently using in Kentucky and nationally. The camera system will immediately text our officers if a reported criminal vehicle has entered the city. This is just another tool our police can use to prevent crime in the city.

BRIDGE on STONEBRIDGE ROAD

The rebuilding of the bridge on Stonebridge Road will begin the first week of April 2022 with a potential completion date of September 21, 2022. Once completed, it will be able to handle up to 18 Ton vehicles.

This project is part of the Bridging Kentucky Program and will be at no cost to our city.

ELECTION 2022

This November, you will be voting for mayor and city councilmembers. The mayorship is a four-year term and the council seat is a two-year term. If you are interested in running for office, the deadline to file with the Jefferson County Clerk's Office, Election Center, is June 7, 2022.

Click on "Elections" and then "Candidate Filing Forms" or go to the county clerk's website at http://elections.jeffersoncountyclerk.org/. Select "Forms and Reports", then select "Candidate Filing Forms" from the dropdown list.

According to Kristi Gay and Ronnie Weeman, Administrators for the Election Center, "The completed forms along with the filing fee can be dropped off or mailed to the Jefferson County Clerk's Office Election Center, Attn: Candidate Filings at 1000 E. Liberty St., Louisville KY 40204 by the filing deadline. All forms require a wet signature, with notarization where applicable."

FRAUD AND IDENTITY THEFT PREVENTION

The Indian Hills Police Department investigated more crimes in 2021 than in 2020. Many of these crimes involve fraud or identity theft. While several of these crimes were committed via computer and with no knowledge of the victim, many others involved contact with the victim.

Below are some useful tips to prevent yourself from falling victim to such a crime...

- **N**EVER purchase gift cards when requested by a telephone caller.
- **N**EVER relay gift card, credit card, or bank account information to someone who has called you and demanded this information to pay for a relative's bail or attorney fees, or your own utility bill.
- **N**EVER send cash via mail or courier service.
- SIMPLY HANG UP if you receive a telephone call that requests any of the above
- **N**EVER place outgoing mail in your home's mailbox, or a public drop box (after the last scheduled pick-up time for the day), that includes checks, credit card information, or personal information such as your Social Security Number it is safer to take directly to your nearest US Post Office location.
- If you are embarrassed about discussing with family members about being a fraud victim, then contact Detective Snook at 502.537.0659 for advice
- Regularly monitor your credit card and bank statements to check for fraudulent charges.
- Call our Dispatch at 893-2677 to report any suspicious activity.

The Indian Hills Police Department, along with several departments across the country, have received reports of telephone scams involving the possible kidnapping of family members.

These scammers will convince the victim that they have kidnapped the victim's child or grandchild, and demand that the victim drive to a designated ATM or provide specific bank or credit card information over the telephone. These scammers are very skilled at obtaining information from the victim that makes the hoax convincing. These scams are similar in nature to those that involve a supposed family member needing bail money or attorney fees following, or to prevent, an arrest.

RESIDENTS—PET OWNERS

Please be a responsible pet owner and a better neighbor—do not let your dog/pet run loose. Any animal must be on a leash and not be permitted to run at large when not in an enclosed backyard. It is not only a violation of City Code §6.04.020 A but Metro Animal Control Services. You surely don't want your neighbor contacting Metro Animal Services filing a complaint.

REMINDER: License tags and rabies vaccination tags shall be required for each dog or cat four months of age or older in Jefferson County.

REMINDER: Scoop up your dog's waste and dispose of it properly.

Ecotech observes six holidays a year for residential customers:


New Years Day Memorial Day Independence Day Labor Day Thanksgiving Day Christmas Day

LOOKING FORWARD TO WARMER DAYS!!

Here are some important **REMINDERS** as you begin spending and enjoying more time outdoors:

Please walk on the left side of the street facing traffic, not in the middle of the road.

WALK your pet on your left with a short leash

If riding your bike and/or your children riding bikes: for your and your children's safety, wear bike helmets; ride with the flow of traffic; and obey Stop & Yield signs.

Lawn mowing and leaf removal should be done after 9:00 AM, and end at 6:00 PM M-F. Be considerate of your neighbors—they don't want to hear the lawn mower or leaf blower while they sit on their patio or deck.

No commercial lawn care on Sundays.

If you received/purchased a tree through the Indian Hills Tree Program, please keep the deer cage in place for 5 to 6 years.

JIM'S REMINDERS:

- No parking on dirt or grass park on hard/durable surfaces only
- No inoperable or unlicensed motor vehicles on property (store in garage)
- No more than 4 cars stored outside of garage
- **No** basketball goals at or on street
- No rubbish, trash or yard trimmings allowed to be stored on property
- No boats, ski jets, campers or utility trailers in view from street
- No deteriorating, rusted or falling gutters
- No cooking grills on front porch or front yards
- No indoor furniture at front of home

Before you build or remodel (includes driveways, swimming pools and any interior or exterior renovations), a City permit is required. A permit is also needed for a dumpster or an outdoor storage container, such as a POD (Portable On Demand Storage). They are not allowed to be dropped and parked on City streets.
