CITY TAX RATE & BUDGET

At our June Council Meeting, the Council voted for <u>NO</u> increase in the tax rate on property taxes and to continue the 20% discount for FYE 06/2024. The tax rate will remain at 19.1¢ per \$100 of assessed value; and the 20% discount is offered if paid by December 31st as provided in Ordinance No. 1. Series 2023.

The Council also passed an annual budget for FYE 06/2024 as provided in Ordinance No. 2, Series 2023. Both Ordinances may be viewed on the City's website. (www.indianhillsky.org)

2023 PROPERTY TAX BILLS

It's hard to believe that tax season is just around the corner. Here are some important reminders:

As in the past, the 2023 tax bills will be mailed no later than October 31st, If you do not receive it by November 14th, please contact Donna at clerk@indianhillsky.org or 502.893.1375.

The tax bills are mailed <u>only</u> to the property owner at the address provided by the Jefferson County Property Valuation Administrator. If your tax payment is made by your mortgage company or made by someone other than you, it is **your responsibility** to provide a copy of your tax bill to whomever pays your taxes.

The city is not set up to receive credit card payments so we will **never** send an email asking for your tax payment and to pay it by providing your credit card number.

Allow ample time for your payment to arrive by mailing it early. It seems the mail system continues to be slower than in the past years. We would like for our residents to take advantage of the 20% discount, so please be sure your payment may be received no later than December 31, 2023.

MUNICIPAL INSURANCE PREMIUMS TAX

The following has been published in a couple of previous issues of our newsletters; but we feel it is important to keep doing so as a reminder to our residents.

According to a Kentucky League of Cities article dated February 20, 2019, "The collection and administration of the local insurance premium tax was significantly amended in the 2008 General Assembly. The law requires insurance companies subject to the tax to accurately locate risks to the appropriate taxing jurisdiction....". If your policy does not have Indian Hills as the taxing jurisdiction (see below Policy Declaration), please contact your insurance agent to let him/her know your premiums tax should be going to your City.

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Now that schools are back in session, we wanted to remind everyone to be patient and safe when school buses are present on the roadways. It is a violation, not to mention dangerous, to pass a school bus when its stop arm is extended. Please be observant for students walking to and from their bus stops, especially those that may be out before sunrise. PACKAGE THEFTS

During 2022, the Indian Hills Police Department investigated 10 reports of theft of mail matter, which includes packages delivered by Amazon, the USPS, and others. We have investigated 3 reports so far in 2023. Through the efforts of our patrol officers and detective, we have been able to charge suspects in 5 of the 2022 cases and 1 of the 2023 cases.

One measure we can all take part in the reduction of these crimes is to utilize the department's house watch program. This program is not only geared to protect homes from burglaries, but also package thefts. We routinely find packages delivered to homes enrolled in our program and are able to secure and/or notify the resident, so that a local contact can move the package to a secure location.

PERMITS REQUIRED

Before you build or remodel (includes driveways, swimming pools and any interior or exterior renovations), a City permit is required.

A permit is also needed for a dumpster or an outdoor storage container, such as a POD (Portable On Demand Storage). They are not allowed to be dropped and parked on City streets.

BROWNSBORO ROAD DOWNSIZING—UPDATE



The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KTC) and Louisville Metro planned to downsize Brownsboro Road from Mellwood Avenue east at Chenoweth Lane by reducing the now four lanes to only two lanes with a center turning lane.

Back in June, as soon as Mayor Hancock learned about this project through our State Representative Ken Fleming, he sent a message via email to you informing you of it, the date/time of a scheduled public meeting, shared why he was opposed to this change and included a link to see the proposed report/project.

Later in June, he sent a reminder about the July 6th public meeting via email and encouraged you to attend. Mayor Hancock also prepared and mailed a letter to Governor Beshear stating that the City of Indian Hills adamantly opposes the downsizing of Brownsboro Road for multiple reasons and encouraged Governor Beshear to reevaluate because continuing to "right size" our streets is a project we oppose.

Since there was a great showing, over 100 people including six of our council people, at the July 6th public meeting with a majority of those in attendance being opposed to this project, the KTC & Metro decided the project would stop at Hillcrest Avenue... it was later learned that the project would end at Mockingbird Valley Road.

However, Mayor Hancock recently received news that the project has now been delayed. According to KTC, "In order to give ample time for Public Review and comment on the latest revisions to the striping plan, our Central Office has requested this resurfacing be delayed until Spring 2024."

Mayor Hancock will inform our residents of any planned public meetings in the future. Together, we can make a difference!

TREE PRESERVATION

By contributing to the Indian Hills Tree Program, the City of Indian Hills have been encouraging our residents to plant canopy trees and to date the tree program has been very successful.

There are times when trees may need to be removed due to being dead or diseased, but before removal of any tree of more than eight inches (measured three feet from the ground) in diameter within the city you must obtain a permit from the city. When a permit is issued for tree removal, the city shall require the planting of a suitable replacement tree or trees.

Just a reminder to water your trees during long periods of dry weather; protect our creeks—please DO NOT dump any yard waste, limbs, hanging baskets in our creeks!!!

MULCHING VS BAGGING....

INDIAN HILLS TREE CANOPY PLANTING PROGRAM 2023



We are excited to have you participate. Please read the following instructions and feel free to ask any questions prior to completing and submitting the attached application below.

Costs are shared between the City and private property owners:

- This program is a shared expense between the resident and the City of Indian Hills. The total cost is to be about \$575. You agree to pay half the total cost of the tree & services provided (\$287.50) and the City pays the other half (\$287.50).
- The trees we have to offer are available to any resident of the City of Indian Hills who owns a detached home and is a taxpayer.
- · This program is limited to one tree per household. *Elected officials & Committee members are not eligible.*
- · The tree must be planted in the front or side yard to optimize canopy shade tree benefits.
- Species for this program are limited to those designated by the arborist and include:
 Tulip Poplar, Red Maple, Scarlet Oak, White Oak and Bald Cypress
